

RURAL SAFETY NEW FOCUS FOR PARTNERS

NEW HOPE GROUP AND LIFEFLIGHT HAVE ENTERED INTO A NEW PARTNERSHIP PROJECT AIMED AT IMPROVING RURAL HEALTH AND SAFETY IN FARMING COMMUNITIES AROUND NEW ACLAND MINE.

The two-year project will focus on boosting education and awareness around rural safety practices and fostering a better understanding of common rural incidents.

New Acland General Manager David Vink said he was surprised to learn that in the previous financial year LifeFlight rescued 31 people from farms in the Oakey area and that while this statistic included both medical emergencies and serious accidents there seems to remain a real need for information.

- "This project gives the local community, as well as those involved with the mine, an opportunity to learn from LifeFlight's expertise in rural safety and will help to deliver safer outcomes for local farming operations", David said.
- "Safety is the mining industry and New Hope's number one priority and a core value of the Company so we're really passionate about bringing this project to the local communities around New Acland Mine.
- "LifeFlight is best known for responding to medical emergencies but its staff have a great deal of knowledge about preventing injury and what to do in an emergency to lessen the severity of injuries when they do occur.
- "The part of the project we're most looking forward to is bringing together different parts of our community to talk about best practice and how we can learn about rural health and safety from each other."

LifeFlight's Toowoomba Base Manager Andrew Riches said LifeFlight had been responding to rural medical emergencies on the Downs and in the South-West for the past 10 years giving them an excellent understanding of the most common incidents in the area.

- "Our mission is to save lives and serve the community and we believe this project will provide education on the issues that affect these communities most," Andrew said.
- "The project will deliver five safety education workshops on topic areas like machinery and equipment, animal safety and vehicle and motorbike safety.
- "Many of the incidents we respond to could have less serious consequences or could be prevented so this project is a great opportunity to start conversations in our community about how to keep ourselves, and the people around us, safe."

In addition to the rural health and safety project, the New Hope partnership will also provide financial support to LifeFlight's air-medical service to ensure the local rural community has access to a high level of care in emergency situations.

RESEARCH HONES IN ON LOCAL PRIORITIES

NEW RESEARCH IDENTIFYING AND EXPLORING HOW BEST TO STRENGTHEN THE SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT AND RESILIENCE OF TOWNS AROUND NEW ACLAND MINE WILL HELP LOCALS TO BUILD A STRONG FUTURE FOR THE AREA.

The research, funded by New Hope and undertaken by social planning company Elliott Whiteing, investigated the needs and wants of local communities and identified six key development themes.

New Hope Group's Senior Community Advisor Helen Williams said the six themes will shape the company's investment programs moving forward.

"Working with the community to complete this research means we can ensure our investment programs are targeted at what is important to the community, and therefore deliver better outcomes for the area," Helen said. "The strength of this research comes from the community's participation so we're really grateful to the people who took the time to participate in the survey, and the workshops and interviews."

The six development themes revealed by the research include: local skill development across industries; indigenous community and economic programs; community infrastructure; support for local business and entrepreneurship; community health; and environmental health.

"New Hope recognises that being an active member of the community means

going beyond providing employment and training opportunities and should also include supporting the development and long term viability of the area post-mining," Helen said.

"This deeper understanding of what is important to our community means we can support people building a strong and positive future for the area, work that will last well after mining has finished."

WORKING TOGETHER ON GROUNDWATFR

NEW HOPE GROUP HAS BEEN WORKING WITH LOCAL LANDHOLDERS TO IMPROVE THE UNDERSTANDING OF GROUNDWATER AROUND NEW ACLAND MINE.

The Bore Baseline Assessment Program, which assesses current groundwater levels and quality at properties around New Acland Mine, is well on the way to reaching its half way mark.

The program has been designed to develop an understanding and provide a baseline of current groundwater levels and water quality on those surrounding properties.

New Hope also operates 42 monitoring bores in and around New Acland Mine to track groundwater on a daily and monthly basis.

LOCAL CONTRACTOR AWARDED ROAD UPGRADE WORKS

LOCALLY BASED CIVIL CONSTRUCTION FIRM OSTWALD BROS HAS BEGUN WORK ON ROAD UPGRADES AT NEW ACLAND MINE.

Approximately 30 jobs have been created to deliver safer intersections and improved access to the northern part of the mine.

Work will take place at two separate locations along the Oakey - Cooyar Road and include construction of a new entry point into the New Acland Mine site, as well as an upgrade of the Langes Road and Oakey - Cooyar Road intersection.
